Homily

With much gratitude, thank you for coming to this Christ Eve celebration.

O Come, oh come Immanuel "Immanuel" means God with us.

We humans are but creatures of the Earth and have self-identified us as Homo Sapiens, that is *Wise Man*.

Some of us might wonder at this statement by saying What if only that were so?

When we place ourselves in context of our history, we might glimmer an appreciation of what *Wise Man* actually may connotatively mean. Certainly, we can agree that Homo Sapiens is not at all wise Given a dictionary definition in light of the ever present human circumstances we create to destroy ourselves one way or another.

That means from what many of us choose to eat to what battles we want to fight for whatever purpose we create. Homo Sapiens simply indicates that we have an evolved frontal cortex that contains sufficient neurons to handle flows of energy some of which we label thought as the product of thinking which we make up moment by moment whether or not we declare our responsibility for our own thinking behavior.

God with us. When we look in to the perceivable universe, thanks to the James Webb telescope, we witness an unimaginable and incomprehensible magnitude of stars and galaxies all of which that aren't even there any more. We used to calculate the age of our universe as only 13.8 billion years. With the James Webb telescope we may be 26.7 billion years old. And Earth? Just about 4.7 billion years. We are just witnessing the light there from that is now just reaching us given the incredible distances involved. As a side note, we may remember that when we look at the Sun, what we see is a double illusion. First, it takes 8 minutes for the Sun's light to be perceived on earth so, hence, the Sun is not where we think it is and, secondly, that image we think is out there is really just in our visual cortex. God with us. Each Christmas for the past 2000 years some of us have come together to recollect just what *God with us* means in human form. Biblical scholarship and archeology informs us that many of the bible stories are just that - stories.

Through out human history we have created stories so that we humans may treat one another a bit better than our terrestrial animal neighbors who act somewhat reactively to their internal needs and to external threats to their survival. Some of these stories contradict other stories and sometimes even their own internal messages. One message may seem constant: *Do unto other as you would have them do unto you.* Yet this admonition might be placed in contrast to *An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth* and *Turn the other cheek* and, of course, *Judge not lest you be judged.*

We are, at best, the most perfect in our imperfection of all the species on Earth: we are an inherent contradiction. We tend to be blind to the actuality of a circumstance just the way it is and create instead a situation that is just we what we think it is.

God with us. God we say is the Creator. Are we not the creators of our own situations, that is, the way we may interpret a circumstance to be? And behind that realization is yet another. Jesus identified as *I am the Alpha and the Omega* (Rev. 1: 8), I am the beginning and the end which means Christ Consciousness where in the illusion of time we transcend to realize God with us and, hence, as Mister Eckhart would say: *The eye through which I see God is the same eye through which God sees me; my eye and God's eye are one eye, one seeing, one knowing, one love.*

The only actual reality beyond the present, past, future is **only this moment, now**. Unicity.

And how do we experience such unicity? Ask, **NOW**, for what benefit am I experiencing this anger, grief, sadness, anxiety, frustration **NOW**?

Be aware of, acknowledge, accept and consciously let go of our concept of the Great Trinity: **Me, Myself, and** I – that which we use to separate ourselves from ourselves and others and our environment.

We know that life is not a personal event unless we make it so. Life is just life. And accordingly we may remember Jesus' prayer: *Father, may they be one as you and I are one that they may be one in us. (John 17:21-23)* Unicity.

Be wise. Practice deep gratitude and understanding, keen discernment, and grow an ever increasing capacity for sound judgment, only-just-now.
